Response Rate Fun Facts (April 28)

- Arizona, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Utah were tied with 15 other states for the highest daily self-response rate at 0.3 percent each
- Washington had the highest cumulative total selfresponse rate (58.8 percent) for all Western States, followed by Utah at 58.7 percent and Colorado at 57.4 percent
- Deuel County, South Dakota was the top county in the West by area of the country in daily self-response with 1.2 percent
- Los Alamos County, New Mexico had the highest cumulative total self-response rate at 74 percent and also the highest cumulative internet selfresponse rate at 71.3 percent
